Harvest Preparatory School would like to announce that we are continuing our participation in the federal Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) for the 2026-2027 school year. This marks our second year using this national program, which allows us to serve healthy breakfasts and lunches to our entire student body completely free of charge.

All enrolled students can eat school meals at no cost every day under this initiative. Parents do not need to fill out any free and reduced-price meal applications to get these meals. This adjustment eliminates unnecessary paperwork for families and ensures every child on our campus has seamless access to great nutrition.

FREE HEALTH CARE: Families with children eligible for school meals may be eligible for FREE health care coverage through Medicaid and/or Ohio's Healthy Start & Healthy Families programs. These programs include coverage for doctor visits, immunizations, physicals, prescriptions, dental, vision, mental health, substance abuse and more.
